## Welcome to Pastor Michael Hershberger

As part of the revision process and in response to the economic conditions of our day the council last fall began searching for a Pastor who would become the visitation Pastor of Grace and preach once or twice a month. As we searched Pastor Bill Kallestad agreed to visit those who were hospitalized and shut-in until the end of January. That time was extended until we could find a Pastor who desired to be part of the Grace team.

This position was discussed at the annual meeting and the congregation voted to support this position by providing the needed funding. On Tuesday night, at the recommendation of the Grace personnel committee the council has entered into a one year contract with Pastor Michael Hershberger. Currently Pastor Michael is on leave from call and living in Story City. He is, however, teaching classes at Grandview College.

As part of the duties of being our visitation Pastor he will visit those who are hospitalized and shut-in. In addition he will assist in making initial contacts with those who have visited Grace. These "visitor" contacts may also involve coordinating lay members of the congregation as hospitality visitors. In addition, he will bring the word to the congregation through preaching once or twice a month.

We are very excited that Pastor Michael will be serving with us in the coming year. He brings a deep sense of faith and the presence of God's grace. He values word and sacrament ministry. **On Sunday, March 29<sup>th</sup>, Pastor Michael will be present at both services and between worship as we meet and greet him.** We encourage you to be present and to welcome him as he serves among us in the coming year. Normally, a congregation would hold a congregational meeting and call a Pastor. Since this position is less than half time, and is a one year contract the council has the authority to enter into a contract with the Pastor and is doing so with the approval of the Bishop.

We see this as another step toward becoming a growing congregation that deeply values word and sacrament ministry and empowerment of the laity.

## **Crazy Talk: A Not-So-Stuffy Introduction to Theology**

Last fall we hosted a web cast adult class on Mark. This spring on Monday nights, beginning March 23 from 7:00-9:00, we have a second opportunity to participate in Luther Seminary's lay school of theology. The class is called, "Crazy talk: A Not-So-Stuffy Introduction to Theology" The professor is Rolf Jacobson who is associate Professor of Old Testament. Here is what he has said regarding the topic:

When people heard that Humor and Theology had started dating each other, they whispered, "It'll never work. The two are just not a good match for each other." When Humor and Theology got engaged...and then married, the skepticism only grew more intense, "Can these two really live together?" But it turns out that Humor and Theology, in fact, are great partners. In the tradition of Martin Luther, who both knew a good joke and a good theological distinction, this course will draw on humor to explore many of the basic concepts of the Christian faith, focusing on what the church has found most important in its central theological concepts. If you want to learn more about the basic theology of the faith in a not-so-stuffy way, this is your opportunity. Simply come to the Grace gathering hall on Monday, March 23<sup>rd</sup> from 7:00-9:00...it's free!

## **Grace Women Lutheran World Relief**

## “So how does this lay ministry stuff work anyway?”

Greetings! Now that we have a Lay Ministry Team that is in place, I thought it might be helpful if I filled you in on what has been happening around here, and what this lay ministry stuff really means to us on a practical basis. Yes, we have a good understanding of the importance of lay leaders to the life of the church, and yes, we no doubt see that there is a lot of lay ministry happening in this place already. So if we already have a lot of that going on, what are we doing, then, with this Lay Ministry Team and how does that affect what we do?

I'm glad you asked! How's this for a classic Lutheran answer – 1) having a Lay Ministry Team does not change what we are currently doing, and 2) having a Lay Ministry Team changes everything. What in the world does that mean??

There is good work happening here. Lots of good work by good people. And the Lay Ministry Team is here to encourage and uplift that continued good work. OK, so what's different? What's different is **how** we may be going about that good work. Here's what I mean by that. By now many of you have seen the informational forms that we are asking groups to talk about and fill out. The conversations that come out of these, guided by members of the Lay Ministry Team, have the potential to shape the ministry that we do in new ways by

- taking a *fresh* look at what our purpose is in various groups and how we can make that exciting to others – is there a way, perhaps, that we can enhance what we are doing by adding a new twist that hasn't been there before?
- Being more intentional and even varied about how we communicate what we do in our various groups so that the greater congregation – and even the greater neighborhood of which we are a part in the name of evangelism - might be more involved or at least aware.
- Allowing growth to happen in the *intentional invitation* of new members (therefore energy, ideas, etc.) into our existing groups.

I have also become increasingly excited as I have begun to hear about people with various interests popping up with ideas of things we could do, or resources toward which we can point people who might have related interests. I want to encourage the use of people's talents and gifts in new ways. When people share those new ideas with me, I share them with members of the Lay Ministry Team whose “umbrella” of ministry connects best with the idea. That way, meaningful conversations can begin to take place with more people. Is all of this still a work in progress? Absolutely. Will we be able to address and start all the new ideas that may arise all at once? Probably not. Please be patient, though. The most worthwhile things in life tend to take time to develop. Keep the ideas coming, though, and God's Spirit will move throughout our continual prayerful discernment.

Here are some newer things that are currently happening in the realm of lay ministry:

- Many members, from elementary school age and up, have contributed to our 2009 Grace Lenten Devotional and are greatly enriching our Lenten journeys. I have heard from many of you how much you appreciate people sharing their faith in this way. The names of our writers are too many to mention here, but thanks go out to all of you. Maybe we can even find a way for this kind of sharing to continue.
- Several people have been willing to be a part of the weekly Lenten dramas that are being presented at each midweek service. We hope that these scenes are enhancing your worship experience. Our actors include Pat and Denny Rehder, Katy Roat, Jessica Russell, Carol Krause, Michelle Voelker, Natasha Voelker, Rich Snyder, Doug Johnson, Beth Flannery, Mike Flannery, and Leslie Denton.
- We have 11 members who recently attended the Congregations Together in Mission synod-wide event held in Cedar Rapids and had the opportunity to experience a variety of ministry workshops that we will be sharing with the congregation in various ways. Those who attended include Ro and Barb Zimany, Kathy Bowermaster, Joyce Lewis, Ellen Wonderlin, Sharon Morse, Tammy Denton, Verda Swanson, Norm and Lenora Iverson, and Stephanie Johnson.
- The Library Committee recently held a Library Help Day and had a terrific turnout. Everyone was actively engaged in various tasks, and the help and enthusiasm were greatly appreciated.

- The Women's Board hosted a Valentine's party with Mother Goose as a special guest, and those who attended had a delightful time together listening to stories, making crafts, even having a parade!

### **Des Moines Area Religious Council**

DMARC met for the annual business assembly on February 19, 2009, at Highland Park Christian Church.

The executive director reported that assistance was delivered to the people of the greater Des Moines area in a number of ways including the following:

- \*Childcare subsidies through a partnership with Polk County
- \*Rent and utilities assistance through a partnership with the Salvation Army.
- \*Mentoring for at-risk children through a partnership with the Des Moines Public Schools.
- \*Opportunities for interfaith engagement such as the special prayer service for victims of the terrorist attack in Mumbai, India.
- \*Help for hungry people through nine food pantry sites. Some alarming statistics are that 400 brand new families came to the food pantries in each of the 4 months, October through January. 20% more families were served in December, 2008 compared to December, 2007. The cash of wholesale food rose anywhere from 9% to 52% in less than a year.

There are challenges ahead for DMARC.

The new president is Pastor John Holcombe from Highland Park Christian Church.

Based on the size of our congregation, we are entitled to have several delegates. I encourage Grace members to prayerfully consider the option of becoming a delegate to this very important organization in our community.

In February, members of Grace Lutheran Church donated \$971.00 to DMARC programs and the Emergency Food Pantry. Thank you for your generosity!

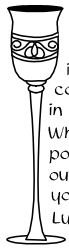
### **Men In Mission**

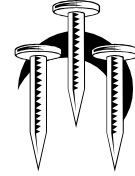

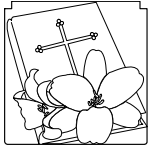

Easter lilies are still available, but the purchase of other flowers to place in the sanctuary is an exciting idea. In looking at the Flower Chart, there are still a number of openings for Altar Flowers during the year. Please look at the chart, and if you can provide flowers for an open Sunday, it would be appreciated. The Worship Committee is always willing to listen and discuss comments from the worshipping congregation.

Pastor Cline, Stephanie and I have been working on planning the various services for Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter. Each of these services has been given a lot of thought with the hope to make them even more meaningful to the worshipping people. I have been very pleased with the response of the choirs to the music selected for this season. There is always a great deal of planning to make the services fit together.

I have been pleased with how quickly the congregation has become comfortable with Liturgy Setting One. We will continue using this setting through May, with the exception of Easter Sunday, when we will return to Setting Two for that day.

The Youth Choir and Chapel Chimers will resume rehearsals on Wednesday, April 15. Carol Woodruff and I will plan on these two ensembles providing music for worship on Sunday, May 10. These groups have been on hiatus during Lent, but will resume after Easter. We hope that even more of our youth will take advantage of these two ensembles.

On May 17, our new bishop will be providing the sermon and be an active part of our worship service. We look forward to having him in our congregation.

Again, I want to thank all those that helped with the choir from Augustana College. I am still hearing positive comments about the students and their music presentation.

There are a number of opportunities for our youth to attend various Music Camps in the summer. I would like to encourage our youth, grades 5-12, to attend a camp. I will put brochures about these camps on the bulletin board outside the office as they become available.

I keep finding new music that I have been using for preludes, offertories, and postludes. This is all on websites that are public domain. I hope these selections have added to your worship. It is a pleasure to serve the people of Grace.

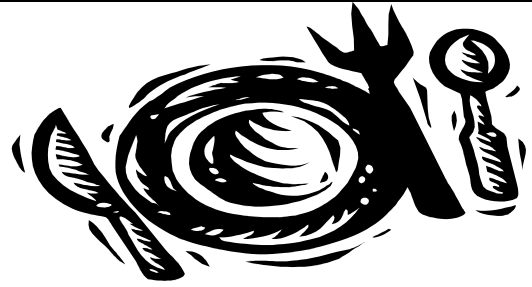

### New Urbandale Food Pantry Meets Local Needs

The Urbandale Food Pantry at 7611 Douglas, Suite 31, opened in October 2008 to help struggling individuals and families in Urbandale and Windsor Heights obtain the food and personal care items they need. It is funded through monetary pledges of area churches, the cities of Urbandale and Windsor Heights, and citizens and community organizations. It receives food items through the Des Moines Area Religious Council (DMARC) Emergency Food Pantry.

According to coordinator Eileen Boggess, the pantry served 404 individuals from 132 families in February. Those using the food pantry include single older women, people with disabilities, fathers who are contractors, painters or construction workers who can't find work and need food for their families, immigrant families, wives of soldiers serving in Iraq, and others who recently lost their jobs and don't know how to secure food stamps.

If you live in Windsor Heights or Urbandale and need assistance, you are eligible to use the pantry:

- **Visit the pantry during normal hours** – Monday, Wednesday & Thursday, 10 a.m.–2 p.m. Bring documentation that confirms your residency (i.e. a billing statement) and an ID for each household member to be served.
- **You will receive a supply of prepackaged, nutritionally-balanced meals** and personal care products.
- **You can use the pantry once each month.**

To help the Urbandale Food Pantry:

- **Continue supporting the DMARC Food Pantry** by including a monetary donation with your regular offering to Grace. Simply designate "Food Pantry" on a blank line

on your offering envelope. Contributions to DMARC help the Urbandale pantry and other distribution sites.

- Make a monetary donation directly to the Urbandale Food Pantry to help them buy food at discounted rates through the Food Bank of Iowa.
- Donate unused, unopened personal care products, including 8 oz. bottles of shampoo/conditioner, soap, deodorant, toothpaste, toilet paper, sanitary napkins and diapers.
- Volunteer by filling food orders and more.

### Hope Ministries Needs Help to Serve Meals

Hope Ministries plans to serve and deliver more than 1,500 warm meals to low-income, homeless and home-bound residents in greater Des Moines on Easter Sunday, April 12. More than 100 volunteers are needed that day to help serve a free meal from noon-2 p.m. at Hope Café, connected to Hope Ministries Bethel Mission at 1310 6<sup>th</sup> Ave., Des Moines, and to deliver in-home meals to the elderly, shut-ins and others in need.

The Easter meal program is part of Hope Ministries' Table of Grace for homeless and hungry people in Des Moines and central Iowa. Community meals are offered free without regard to race, color, creed or religion. Over 10,000 meals are served each month – between 300 and 400 meals per day.

Actual offerings are under budget by \$11,235 for the first two months of the budget year. Grace expenses are under budget by \$12,042, which offsets the income shortage. It will be important to keep pledges and offerings as current as possible to enable Grace to continue to meet obligations on a timely basis.
